

## **MEETING WITH IBONE BENGOETXEA**

Yesterday, on **October 8**, the citizens' platform **Guggenheim Urdaibai Stop** held a meeting with **Ibone Bengoetxea**, First Deputy Lehendakari and Minister of Culture and Language Policy.

We are grateful that the meeting, which the platform requested, was granted.

Our objectives were clear:

- First, to give a **brief introduction of the platform**, clearly stating our goal: to **definitively abandon the Guggenheim Urdaibai project**.
- Secondly, to put all our concerns and questions about the project on the table.
- And finally, to learn what information and opinions Ms. Bengoetxea has about the project, both as Deputy Lehendakari and as Minister of Culture.

Our concerns can be summarized as follows:

- An impositional governance style
- Actions contrary to the aims of Biosphere Reserves
- A project that is **not the result of any diagnostic assessment**
- A project that, as such, does not even exist
- Planning within a Special Protection Zone of the Natura 2000 network, the most vulnerable area
- Clear evidence of saturation in the estuary
- Disregard for the limits of the planet
- Waste of public money for private purposes
- A museum that does not respond to the needs of the region

- Manipulation of the public by linking the healthy future of the Biosphere Reserve with this project
- The launch of whitewashed participatory processes
- Encouragement of the loss of local culture

To these general concerns, we added our **discomfort with recent statements** made by Ibone Bengoetxea herself, which have been firm in supporting the project.

She also raised the concept of **Nature and Art** as a pairing, comparing it favorably to the previous **Industry-Nature** model. At the same time, she publicly admitted that the communication and sharing of information around the project **have not been handled well**, and acknowledged the need for **dialogue**, although she made it clear that the **government intends to move forward** with the project regardless.

Thus, compared to the previous legislative period, the Basque Government is showing a **more proactive attitude** toward the project, which is also part of the current **government agreement**.

In light of this, all public administrations appear to be aligned.

However, we must stress that this is not a public project.

The Minister believes the project **could be a good opportunity for the region**, and emphasized that, as the party that won the elections, **they have the legitimacy and right to implement it**.

The government wants to move forward with the project—but **not alone**. She told us that **dialogue is necessary**, and that the **region deserves it**.

The platform agrees on the **need for dialogue**, but we believe that all the **administrative steps currently being taken to make this project viable** must be **halted**, and that a **genuine reflection process** should begin. **Without imposition**.

Let's conduct a **thorough diagnosis** of the region's situation, and seek solutions through a **participatory project**.

Let's start from scratch, and remove a private museum that will only intensify tourism inthe heart of the Biosphere Reserve.

However, the current situation is different.

While we are being offered dialogue, the Dalia building in Gernika has been demolished, Murueta's municipal urban plan (HAPO) and the Gernika-Markina Sub-Regional Plan are being modified.

Even more concerning, the **project for the wooden walkway (palafito)**—which would be part of the green route connecting the museums to be built in Gernika and Murueta—has already been **approved and put out to tender**, with public announcements stating that **construction is to begin in the autumn**.

Given this situation, our concerns are clear, and **reaching a shared position on this project is difficult**.

In order to **respect citizens' rights**, we demanded that the project be **made public**, along with its **environmental impact report**.

The absence of such critical documentation leaves us unprotected, especially given the many small steps being taken in a very clear direction.

This project requires a complete evaluation.

Taking into account all the **substantial reasons** we laid on the table, we **hope and expect** that this at least **sparked some basic reflection**.

Nevertheless, this meeting has not changed our view of the project.

Today, we are more convinced than ever that the project is just a random idea proposed without any diagnostic backing, and while they try to make it viable step by step by twisting and bending laws and regulations, misinformation dominates—or at least, that's what they want us to believe.
